Structure, Governance & Management

Constitution

The Charity is an unincorporated association. The Trust was granted charitable status by OSCR on 31 December 2010.

Appointment of Trustees

The management committee, which normally meets on a monthly basis, are the charity's trustees. Trustees are elected at the Annual General Meeting which is normally held in November. Under the constitution, there must be a minimum of three and not more than nine elected trustees. The trustees may co-opt a further three trustees if they consider it would be in the interests of the Trust to do so.

Objectives & Activities

Charitable purposes

The aim of the Trust is to commemorate the life of Joanna Walters by giving grants to causes that she would approve of.

Mission Statement

In memory of Joanna Walters, and to celebrate her life and achievements as an inspirational person, teacher and motivator, the Trust will provide opportunities to help people enrich their lives and the lives of others, through sport, outward bound, educational and environmental projects, both at home and abroad.

The Trust is an approved Scottish Charity, regulated by the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator. It has nine appointed trustees. The Trust is actively fundraising and collecting donations in Joanna's memory.

Activities

The Trust provides opportunities to help people enrich their lives and the lives of others, through sport, outward bound, educational and environmental projects, both at home and abroad.

Achievements & Performance 2016-2017

The Trust made ten grants to various individuals and organisations, totalling £28,210, all in line with our mission. The Trust also raised £40,855 (net) to fund future projects.

Financial Review

Receipts on the unrestricted fund were £58,480:

- £25,892 Receipts from fundraising events, including the Caprington Big Day Out, a St Andrews Ball in London and the Capenoch Garden Opening.
- £17,923 Receipts from individual fundraising activities, including a swim from Arran to Troon, a bike ride around the North Coast of Scotland and the Madrid Marathon.
- £14,323 Voluntary Donations received from friends, family and other donors interested in the work of the Trust.
- £342 Trading receipts from the sale of calendars and Mr Roberelli children's CDs.

Payments for the year were £45,835. This consisted of:

- 11 grants, made to:
 - Feedback Madagascar: £18,000
 - Outward Bound Trust: £2,500
 - Logie Coldstone Primary School: £900
 - Aboyne Primary School: £900
 - Network of Wellbeing (Gordon Schools, Huntly): £1,700
 - Aberlour Trust (Forest Schools Project): £1,640
 - East Midlands Association of Teachers of Mathematics: £500
 - Walthamstow School for Girls: £500
 - Vinney Green Secure Unit: £750
 - Crooksbarn Primary School: £600
 - Wolverhampton Home Education Group: £220

TOTAL: £28,210

- Purchase of stock (calendars and CDs): £304.
- Payments related to organising charitable activities: £17,285. These costs included organising both the Caprington Big Day Out and the St Andrews Ball (London), and a reimbursement to the RNLI whom were joint beneficiaries of the Arran to Troon swim.
- Costs of Fundraising: £36 (subscription costs for Just Giving).

At 31st March 2017, monies available for use with future grants were £62,875.22 consisting of:

- £19,411.51 (held in the bank)
- £43,463.71 (invested with ethical microfinance provider Oikocredit).

Plans for Future Periods

The Trustees reviewed the following grants to **good causes in Aberdeenshire**, funding projects which provide education in the outdoors and which will be made in FY 2017/18. In order to bring as many of these to fruition as possible, it was decided to increase the total budget from £6,000 to £9,200. The five recipients are:

- Banchory-Devenick Primary School: £1,800. Grant to fund equipment for their forest school. They will use it to purchase a tarpaulin and tools, such as loppers, secateurs, whittling tools and bowsaws, as well as firelighting equipment, a fire safety blanket and cooking equipment.
- Aberdeenshire Sailing Trust (SC043046): £2,270. This will fund the purchase of a new safety boat. This will enable them to offer sailing at Knockburn Loch throughout the sailing season as currently they can only offer sailing there from July October as their only rescue boat is needed at Loch of Skene from April end of June. With this grant they will be able to offer sailing to local primary schools in the form of activities days or after school clubs, as well as activities for groups such as brownies & cubs in the Summer term. They will also set up a new disability sailing night.
- Aboyne Academy Climbing Club: £1,160. This will be spent on new climbing equipment in
 order to make activities more accessible to a range of physical abilities. Their goal is to extend
 their ability to use outdoor crags as well as the indoor wall for a greater range of activities
 including rock climbing and abseiling. They plan to add larger accessible climbing holds to their
 older wall to facilitate a greater range of users.
- 1st Fraserburgh Scout Group: £1,970. This will allow them to buy camping equipment so
 that they can develop their nascent Duke of Edinburgh's award scheme, allowing more of the
 scouts to take part. As well as the camping equipment it will enable a member of staff to
 complete their Mountain Leader assessment which is a requirement for to offer the Gold Duke
 of Edinburgh's award.
- Peterhead Sea Cadets (SC023599): £2,000. This money will be a significant portion of the money required to buy the sea cadets a box trailer. They need the trailer to store all the kit required to take children out on the water, as last year their previous store was broken into and equipment was stolen. Storing it in a trailer is both more secure, and also will allow them the flexibility to transport equipment for other unit activities including the unit's annual summer camp, D of E expedition training, fundraising activities and training days for the cadets.

The Trustees also reviewed the following **Maths Grants** which were awarded with the aim of investing grant money into education, and particularly innovation in education. It was agreed that seven grants will be awarded in FY2017/18, totalling £4540:

- Langham School in Essex: £750. The grant will help them to develop Maths learning outside the classroom. The recently qualified Outdoor Practitioner has an area next to her classroom where she has put some shades and blackboards, and now she can furnish this with, amongst other things, maths vocabulary wall signs, giant numberlines, dominoes, sand and water trays and an outdoor teaching clock. We look forward to seeing photos of this in action.
- Castlehill, in Dunbarton: £750. The school has identified what many teachers find, that mathematically able children, when faced with "wordy" questions, fall apart. They are using their grant of £750 to introduce problem solving cards into their teaching, to replace textbook questions. These sturdy reusable cards pose real-life problems and the full set covers the full

- primary age-range. Tackling these should give the children the ability to justify their reasoning and develop a robust confidence in applying their skills.
- Meridian Community Primary School & Nursery in East Sussex: £750. The grant is going to encourage children to develop and share a love of Maths at home, with a lending library. With £750 they will buy games that their Reception and KS1 children can borrow after a weekly visit to the library.
- Hope Primary School in Huyton, Knowlsey: £700. The school is also working outside, to develop a love of maths and seeing the practical use of maths in everyday life. The grant will help to build "The Maths Station" with activities that the children can choose to take part in during their lunch and break times. The plan is that a specialist subject teacher will train those children who lack mathematical confidence, so they become familiar and confident with the activities available. They can then become maths play leaders, taking responsibility for the Maths Station and becoming role models by teaching others how to use and enjoy it.
- Lowdham CofE Primary School, Nottingham: £500. The grant will kick-start a "fruit shop stall" and encourage some young business minds in a Primary School. Canvassing their market, costing, budgeting and calculating mark-ups is going help them develop a range of mathematical skills. Their head teacher has done this before and is keen to share the experience.
- Brackensdale Enhanced Resource Junior School: £450. Brackensdale is an inclusive school with special provision to support children with autism and attachment disorder; 52% of their children have special educational needs. The grant will help them buy equipment for practical, sensory and real-life maths activities. This will include buckets and measuring jugs to teach problem solving through water play, place value counters to explore numbers in a hands-on and visual way, and outdoor problem-solving signs.
- Kirkton of Largo Primary School, Fife: £640. The school are planning another 'outdoor
 maths shed' to promote mathematical outdoor learning. This grant will help furnish a shed with
 blackboard sides and to kit it out internally with baskets filled with a range of rustic math discs,
 sticks and stones, problem cards, wooden numerals, measuring equipment as well as bunting
 and number border rolls.

In addition, the Trustees committed to continue to support the **Outward Bound Trust (SC040341)**, over a fixed period of five years with annual grants of £5,220. The total grant over the period will enable up to 150 additional disadvantaged young people from Ayrshire to benefit from Outward Bound courses. The annual donation will be used to support up to 30 young people from Ayrshire Young Carers at 40% of the course cost, any funding not taken by Ayrshire Young Carers in that year would be used to support another group or school in Ayrshire. The commitment to a five year programme will mean they are able to provide this opportunity to disadvantaged young people from Ayrshire over a longer period and therefore provide a more sustained impact.

At the **AGM on 4 December 2017**, the Trustees also agreed:

- To hold a further committee planning meeting early in 2018 in order to determine funding and grant priorities for FY 2018/19.
- To authorise the payment of two grants which were agreed in FY2016/17 but were not processed in that period; these grants are to be paid in the current financial year (FY2017/18).
 These are £850 to Strathdon Primary School for a Forest School and £750 to the Gateway Academy in Blackpool to teach practical maths through cooking.
- To endorse the appointment of Mr Anthony Coleman as the Independent Examiner of accounts for the 2016/17 Financial Year.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of The Jo Walters Trust I report on the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2017, which are set out on the next three pages.

Respective responsibilities of Trustees and Examiner The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 ("the 2005 Act") and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) ("the 2006 Regulations"). The charity's trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1)(d) of the 2006 Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts as required under section (44)(1)(c) of the 2005 Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of Independent Examiner's Statement My examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the 2006 Regulations. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts and seeks explanations from the trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit and, consequently, I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.

C1 Nature and purpose of funds (may be stated on analysis of funds worksheets)

In memory of Joanna Walters, and to celebrate her life and achievements as an inspirational person, teacher and motivator, the Trust will provide opportunities to help people enrich their lives and the lives of others, through sport, outward bound, educational and environmental projects, both at home and abroad.

	Type of activity or project supported	Individual / institution	Number of grants	£
C2 Grants	Second year supporting the Madagascar Seeds for Change II project. The project promotes sustainable and ecological growing of farming crops alongside the existing rainforest. Between this project and the SFC I project, funding directly supports Community Forest Management Associations (CFMs) and 713 housesholds. Funding has helped to restore over 158 hectares of tapia forest, provided 26km of irrigation ditching and 136km of fire barrier. First year supporting this project, with the Outward Bound Trust, who send groups of up to 30 disadvantaged young carers from Ayrshire, annually, on a week long course at their centre at Loch Ell. Siking for children from Logie Coldstone Primary. Outdoor activity which makes the most of the area's natural resources, this grant will pay half of the costs to take the pupils to the local Lecht ski centre. Cycle Training: the grant from the Jo Walters Trust will support and improve the extracurricular cycling activities on offer at Aboyne Primary School, including mountain biking and cycle maintenance and repair. This project will work with pupils and staff from the Support for Learning Department team within the Gordon Schools, Huntly, to deliver a cycle based project including basic bike maintenance public die rids in the local countryside, converting toddlers bikes to balance bikes' to donated to local nursery groups, as well as providing training for NoW saffe to Gold Award level. This project aims to address a gap in provision for pupils with additional needs with NoW agreeing to deliver the project within the SFL Department to undertake the Level 3 Forest Schools Practitioner award through Forest Schools Scotland. Once trained, staff will then be qualified to take small groups of young people into local forests, where they will get the opportunity to learn, play and explore outdoors, something many of the young people who are helped by the Abertour Trust struggle to access but that their peers take for granted.
